>Celebrating Family Farms of the Tug Hill Region


A Solo Exhibit by artist Loretta Lepkowski will on display from October 3 through December. The Opening Exhibit Reception will be held on Friday October 3 from 5-7 p.m. This traveling art exhibit portrays local, working farm families ranging from dairy to beekeeping to maple sugaring. Tug Hill Tomorrow Land Trust (THTLT) worked with Loretta on this project to raise awareness and appreciation of the importance of family farms on Tug Hill.

Lepkowski was raised on a small southern Lewis County dairy farm with a beautiful view of the Adirondacks. Currently, she resides with her spouse, a large animal veterinarian, and her two children and pets just north of the family homestead. Inspired by her upbringing and previous careers in social work and elementary education, she has a passion for painting portraits and working people in various mediums including watercolor, pastel, acrylic and charcoal.

>Eating local in the Adirondacks: A History

Join Author and Historian Hallie Bond for a presentation on Tuesday September 2 at 7 p.m. Bond, who was on the staff at the Adirondack Museum for nearly 30 years, is co-author of the "Adirondack Cookbook." She enjoyed collaborating with veteran chef Stephen Topper on the project. Bond combined her historical research on regional food ways with Topper's reinvention of traditional cuisine for a fresh take on Adirondack dining.

*Flying Fortress: The 8th Air Force in World War II

On Tuesday September 9 at 7 p.m., author and historian Cheryl Pula will give an illustrated talk of historical facts about airmen in World War II, particularly those who were stationed in Britain and flew B-17s in the bombing raids over Germany: the 8th Air Force. The 8th Air Force was made up of 350,000 personnel who flew 10,631 missions, lost 4,145 planes, 47,000 men were killed, 7,000 Purple Hearts were awarded, 46,000 air medals were given out and 17 Medals of Honor were received. Famous alumni of the 8th Air Force include Clark Gable (actor), Tom Landry (a Dallas Cowboys coach), Andy Rooney (60 Minutes), Gene Roddenberry (creator of Star Trek) and Jimmy Stewart (actor).

Pula has written a compelling book series about these heroic fliers and their experiences in WWII. While the books in the series are fiction, they are based on her interviews with World War II veterans. The books will be available for sale and author signing. A native of New York Mills, Cheryl is a retired Reference Librarian, lecturer and history buff.
