**Together Book Talk for Kids & Parents



The book tells the story of Rubin as a cub reporter for a small town Mississippi newspaper in the 1980s who befriends a black high school football star. Years later when Rubin learns that his old friend is being tried for murder, he returns to the south to lead his own investigation. Rubin, who is a visiting writing professor at St. Lawrence University this year, is a regular contributor to The Atlantic Monthly and he has written for the New York Times Magazine, The New Yorker, and the New York magazine. The public is invited to a Reception to Meet the Author and the station crew at 6 p.m. prior to the broadcast and to take part in the live broadcast at 7 pm.
