**Poetry and Illustration Exhibit



"New Works by RC Oster" will be on display at the Library from May 26 through June 30. The Exhibit Opening Reception will be held on Friday June 3 from 5:00-8:00 p.m. Known for his highly detailed renderings of barns and architectural structures, RC has included some Adirondack scenes from the Raquette Lake and Old Forge areas and a masterpiece of Buttermilk Falls near Long Lake. He is a self-taught artist who specializes in free-hand ink drawing—often tinted with color—of regional landmarks and Adirondack scenes. The Opening Reception provides a great opportunity to meet and talk with the artist and visit with other community members. Light refreshments will be served. Acoustic music will be provided by guitarist Dan Vellone.

"Watercolors from Central NY, Italy and Florida": This exhibit by artist Drayton Jones will be on display from July 1 through July 30. Jones paints with strong bold color and line. He prepares with many sketches and composition studies so his final painting is quick and spontaneous. His subject matter is often local and recognizable, yet abstract and stylized to portray the artist's unique perspective. The Exhibit Opening Reception will take place on Friday July 1

from 5-8 p.m. Acoustic music will be provided by guitarist Dan Vellone.
