#Summer Reading Program


"Make a Splash—Read!" is the theme of this year's Summer Reading Program which encourages children to read throughout July. The Kick-off and Registration is Thursday, July 1. The five-week program continues each Thursday until July 29, from 12 noon to 1 p.m. with a variety of activities for children Pre-K and up.

On July 1, the theme is "Whale Tales" with guest speaker, Rachel Taylor of the American Red Cross . On July 8, "Color Your Own Beach Balls" will feature dodge ball games and team play-offs. On July 15, "Decorate Moose Antlers," is the project theme. On July 22, "Pirate Cast Away" will include stories and a party. On July, 29, the final session will feature "Bubble Mania" performed by Doug Rougeaux and it is open to the public. Awards and prizes will be given out. The program is funded by the Town of Webb Summer Recreation Program, with some funding from Mid-York Library System.

The Summer Writers' Workshop is offering an Adult Workshop and a Young Adult Workshop this year. The Adult sessions will be held on the following Wednesdays: July 14, 21, 28 and August 4, from 6-8:30 p.m. The Young Adult Workshop will be held on the following Thursdays: July 22, 29 and August 5, from 1:30-3:30 p.m.

The director of both workshops is author Bibi Wein who has taught numerous workshops in fiction, memoir and poetry to both beginning and experienced writers from ages 11 through 90. Her most recent publications include a short story in the anthology *Motif: Written*

Her essay "Home" will appear in the anthology, "Why We're Here," edited by Bob Cowser, to be published this fall by Colgate University Press. Twice nominated for the Pushcart Prize, she has been a fellow of the NY Foundation for the Arts, Blue Mountain Center, Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, and Yaddo. She has written frequently for *Adirondack Life*, and is a contributing writer for the national magazine, *Wildflower*. She was director of the Summer's Writer's Workshop in 2004 and she is looking forward to returning for her second residency at the Old Forge Library. There is no fee for the workshops, but enrollment is limited.

Participants are required to submit a piece of work to be completed during the workshop that will be included in an anthology. A special "Open Mic" reading will take place on Wednesday, August 11, at 7:30 pm. The public is invited. The Opening Reception of, "Whose Habitat?" by artist Karry Fuller Comfort, is Friday, July 2, from 5-8 p.m. The Verona artist creates narrative paintings from life and memory, that includes portraits, landscapes, stilllife, abstract and figurative works that range from whimsical to thought provoking. "I find that it truly inspires me to develop my own 'imaginary narratives' as I work. This entertains me," she said. She has been showing and selling her work in the central New York region for the past 20 years. She has received numerous awards from Juried Regional Exhibitions. In the Fall of 2008 she was awarded the Best of SUNY-Juried Exhibit-Drawing in Albany. In August 2007 she was awarded the Stevenson Home Scholarship at the Art Center/Old Forge. Author Series

**Bill McKibben, an environmentalist who has written a number of books and articles on global warming and alternative energy, will discuss his latest book, "Eaarth-Making a Life on a Tough Planet" on Wednesday, July 7, at 7:30 p.m. The Boston Globe has called him "probably the nation's leading environmentalist" and Time magazine described him as the "the world's best green journalist." His first book, The End of Nature, published in 1989, offered one of the earliest warnings about global warming. His subsequent books include, The Age of Missing Information; Maybe One; Long Distance: A Year of Living Strenuously; Enough; Wandering Home; and Deep Economy. In 2007 he published The Bill McKibben Reader, a collection of 44 essays written for various publications over the past 25 years. His program will be followed by refreshments and a book signing.

**Dennis Webster, editor of Adirondack Mysteries and Other Mountain Tales, (2009) will present a program on Tuesday, July 13, at 7:30 p.m. about the book's collection of stories and tales written by acclaimed mystery writers and Adirondack authors. Contributing authors who are taking part in the program and will read from their work are John Briant, Cheryl Ann Costa, Paul Nandzik, W. Keith Pomeroy, and Gigi Vernon. A reception and book signing will follow the program.

****Terror in the Adirondacks:** The True Story of Serial Killer Robert F. Garrow," by will be discussed by the author Lawrence P. Gooley on Tuesday, July 20, at 7:30 p.m. The book chronicles the story of Robert Garrow, a serial rapist and killer whose rampage in 1973, set off a manhunt in the Adirondacks. Among his victims were campers near Speculator in Hamilton County where Garrow escaped a police dragnet and traveled up Route 30 through Indian Lake and Long Lake and eventually made his way to Witherbee where he was tracked down and caught. Garrow was shot and killed during a prison escape in September 1978. A Reception and book signing will follow the program.

!The Reader's Theatre Production of "The Cocktail Hour" written by A. R. Gurney, one of the most prolific playwrights in America, will be held Friday, July 16, at 7 p.m. It is presented by Mountain Theatre Company (MTC) and directed by Alan Saban. The witty, urbane play set in upstate New York in the mid-1970s is about a playwright who returns home to get his stuffy, upperclass family's permission to produce a play about them, detailing the conversations that take place when the family gets a bit tipsy before heading to the dining room. Members of the cast are Kelly Hamlin, Stephen Wick, Dr. Carrol Turner and Joyce Turner. It is not recommended for children under 12.

*Emily Elizabeth Dickenson performed by Eleanor Stearns, who portrays the illusive poet, whose life, loves and other forces led to her seclusion from society. Stearns developed her program after extensive research. She has also written portrayals of Clara Barton, Amelia Earhart, and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. In 2005 she received an outstanding performance award at the Theatre Association of New York State Festival for her portrayal of Anastasia in the one-act play Foibles.
