Help Needed in the Voting Booth

The Old Forge Library needs your support on Tuesday, May 20. A budget proposition will appear on the ballot, asking for your approval of an increase in funding for the library. We are asking for an increase of \$35,000, bringing our total annual support from taxes to \$110,000. This increase in funding will allow us to continue all of the great things we do, for an estimated additional cost to taxpayers of less than four cents per thousand of assessed valuation. It's a terrific deal.

It should come as no surprise to area residents that costs have increased substantially since we last asked for a change in our funding five years ago. Fuel and electricity costs have gone through the roof. Speaking of the roof, we have recently had to budget for a new one, at considerable cost. We occupy one of Old Forge's landmark buildings, and the costs of maintaining and improving the building have increased. The added costs of operations have caused us to dip into funds we had hoped to use as a permanent endowment.

But the costs of our operation are worth every penny. We have significantly expanded our hours-from 31 hours/week in 2003 to 44 hours per week in 2008. That's an increase of more than a third. In 2007, our 61 different programs, always free and open to all, hosted over 4,000 at a diverse array of presentations. We offer wireless internet access, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This provides access to information, job searches and e-mail for residents and visitors alike. Over 25,000 books were loaned through the Old Forge Library in 2007. At an average cost of \$20/book, this provided over half a million dollars in reading for the community.

Over the years, we have continued to access as many sources of funds as possible in addition to relying on taxes. Our annual fund appeal has provided necessary funds. The New York State Council on the Arts, the Central New York Community Arts Council and the Theater Development Fund have consistently provided funds for our programs. We have accessed grants from the Community Foundation and other sources. Despite all our efforts, we find that we must once again turn to the public for increased support.

The Old Forge Library is an institution central to our community. Knowledge is empowering, and the library offers free access for all. Robert Seymour said: "It is impossible to put too much importance on the role of public libraries in a democratic society. They offer everyone, from the richest to the poorest, equal access to information." Help support a powerful force in our community-for less than 4 cents per thousand.

We welcome your support on May 20th. Please discuss our needs with your friends and urge them to support the proposition. We will have representatives
